<p>*Listen to the story of 'Goldilocks and the Three Bears' https://www.youtube.com/watch?v=OoUP2PFoOi8 *Use your own set of puppets to retell/ act out the story. (See Art/ DT activity). *The 24th June is 'National writing day' across the UK. It's an annual celebration of how special creative writing is. Can you think of a new adventure story for Goldilocks? Maybe she could become friends with the bears or maybe the bears could visit Goldilocks' house when she is out? What might they get up to? We would love to read your new stories!</p>	<p>*This week we are thinking about halving. Halving is when you share something fairly between two. We can find half of shapes, objects or amounts. *Practise sharing between two. You could use your toys, pennies, pasta...any small objects! Remember that both groups need to have the same amount. Try finding half of 2,4,6,8,10,12,14,16,18 and 20. What happens when you try to share odd numbers like 1,3,5,7 or 9 between 2? *Play a game sharing bones fairly between two dogs: https://pbskids.org/curiousgeorge/busyday/dogs/</p>	<p>*Experiment with a ball. How high does it bounce when you drop it? How can you make it bounce higher? What is the highest bounce you can do outside? (Remember to check with your grown-up where it is ok to bounce your ball). *Try bouncing the ball on different surfaces, such as grass, concrete, on soil etc. Where does the ball bounce best? *If you have more than one ball, you could test out different sizes and styles too. Which type of ball bounces the highest? E.g. a football, netball, tennis ball, inflatable ball, pinpong ball, golf ball, basketball, rubber ball etc.</p>

<p>*Do you think Goldilocks was right to go into the three bears house? Why/ why not? What should she have done? *Everyone makes mistakes sometimes and that's ok. We need to be honest if we do something we shouldn't and then we can learn from it and make better choices next time. What do you do when you make a mistake? How can you make things better? For example, say sorry and really mean it, offer to help with a job, do something kind for someone else etc. Discuss ideas with your grown-ups.</p>	<p>*Complete the activities set on Purple Mash. (You will find these saved in your '2Do's' folder): -Create a 'Wanted' poster for Goldilocks. -Draw the three bears on their chairs. Remember there was a big bear, a medium size bear and a little bear. -Find half of the different shapes, objects and numbers -Phonics Phase 3- using 'th' (as in 'the'), 'th' (as in 'three') and 'ng' (as in 'sing') in words.</p>	<p>*Join in with the singing and dancing for a musical version of 'Goldilocks and the Three Bears'. It has a very catchy chorus with dance steps! You could create your own moves for the verses. https://www.youtube.com/watch?v=UaulRHrJGeU *As it would have been the start of Wimbledon this week, practise your bat and ball skills! If you don't have a tennis racket or bat, think about what else you could use, such as an old tray or frying pan! (Remember to check with your grown-ups first and find an open space away from obstacles!).</p>

It has an important message/ moral about always telling the truth. *What did the woodcutter do that was right? E.g. he was a hardworker, he perservered, he told the truth.What was his friend like? Why didn't he get the same rewards?</p>	<p>*Use cardboard tubes to make your own set of puppet characters from 'Goldilocks and the Three Bears' and then use to act out the story! *Design a new chair for Baby Bear. What kind of chair do you think he would like? Would he like a chair with a pattern or pictures on? Would he like cushions? Remember to label your designs.</p>
